September greetings from The Nippon Foundation. August has come and gone, but the weather across much of Japan continues to set records for high temperatures. Days on which the high temperature reaches 35 degrees Celsius are called *moshobi* (extremely hot day) in Japanese, and as of September 8, Tokyo had experienced 29 *moshobi* this year including four in the month of September. Both of these are record numbers that could go even higher before the month ends.

Life in Japan generally slows down during the month of August. In addition to the Mountain Day public holiday observed on August 11, the traditional *obon* holidays are observed from roughly August 13 to 16. *Obon* is a Buddhist holiday during which the spirits of one's ancestors are said to return to earth, and although not an official public holiday, many businesses close or people take personal holidays to return to their hometowns and spend time with family, making this one of the busiest travel times of the year.

August also means summer holidays for students. Unlike in the United States, Canada, and much of Europe, however, summer vacation in Japan does not coincide with the end of the school year, which runs from March to April. This means that many students have assignments or projects to complete during the vacation. For elementary school students this often includes an individual research project on a topic of personal interest in addition to regular assignments, making the last week of August a hectic time for students and their parents as they rush to finish these assignments before school resumes in September.

Awareness Survey of 18-Year-Olds - 80 Years After WWII

Japan should aim to be a 'free and peaceful' country



The 71st installment of the Awareness Survey of 18-Year-Olds was carried out in mid-June on the theme of "80 Years After WWII," to examine how the young people of the next generation have learned about the war and what kind of country they think Japan should aim to become. Roughly 95% of all respondents replied that they had learned about the war, with two-thirds saying that most of what they remember was learned from classes in school. On the subject of what kind of country Japan should try to become, the top reply was "A free and peaceful country," followed by "An economically strong country," "A disaster-resilient country," and "A country with a strong social-safety net."

First 'Gathering Space' Completed in Noroshi

Project to support reconstruction from Noto Peninsula earthquake revitalizing Suzu City in Ishikawa Prefecture



As part of its support for the medium- to long-term recovery of areas of Ishikawa prefecture damaged by the earthquake and heavy rains that struck the Noto Peninsula during 2024, The Nippon Foundation has formulated a plan to build "gathering spaces" to promote interchanges among residents of the Oku Noto region, and decided to support the construction and operation of these facilities at nine locations.
